

Summer Reading Assignment

ENGLISH 9-12

Dear Student,

This summer reading assignment has been designed to help you strengthen the critical reading skills you'll continue to need next year in school and to introduce you to some engaging literature. We know that students who read over the summer tend to read better throughout the school year. We hope we have recommended some titles that will turn you into a life-long reader!

By the end of the summer, you must read **ONE** work of literature. The *recommended* reading list is the Connecticut High School Nutmeg Nominee list and has been put together by a group of students, public librarians, and school librarians from around Connecticut, with considerable attention to what you will enjoy reading. We strongly encourage you to choose a book from this list. Make sure you select a book that you haven't already read. The list includes books that are at a variety of reading levels, so choose one that is appropriate for you. Please be aware that some books paint realistic pictures of young adult and adult life, so evaluate your choices with the guidance of your parent or guardian.

We learn about ourselves, our world, and literature when we have the opportunity to converse with others about the texts we've read. Within the first two weeks of your return to school, your teacher will assign one of the four following options for "conversations" about texts: 1) An oral presentation demonstrating your thoughts, opinions and questions in response to the text, 2) A group discussion in which you'll converse with your peers about the books you've read, 3) Technologically-based conversation using technological tools to convey your thoughts, opinions or question in response to the text you've read, 4) Written conversation (essay) in response to an essential question you'll encounter in your coursework.

Regardless of the option your teacher assigns, your knowledge of the text you've read will be assessed using the following criteria: 1) information about the text is accurate, 2) multiple examples and text references are used to support one's opinions or arguments, and 3) the "conversation" enhances others' understanding or appreciation of the work read.

This assignment will be included in your first quarter grade.

We want you to enjoy this opportunity to become involved in some exciting reading and return to school ready to share your pleasurable and rewarding experience.




Dumplin' by Julie Murphy


Girl in the Blue Coat by Monica Hesse


More Happy Than Not by Adam Silvera




The Rest of us Just Live Here by Patrick Ness


Simon vs. the Homo Sapiens Agenda by Becky Albertali
